About NBRC

The Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC) is a Federal-State partnership created to provide infrastructure and economic development assistance to projects in counties within the Northern Border region of Maine, New Hampshire, New York, and Vermont that have varying degrees of economic and demographic distress. The Commission was Authorized by Congress in 2008 (40 U.S.C., Subtitle V), and first appropriated by Congress in 2010 and is modeled after the Appalachian Regional Commission

Authority and oversight functions of the NBRC are shared by five Members: The Federal Government, represented by the Federal Co-Chair, and the States of Maine, New Hampshire, New York, and Vermont, represented by the Governors of those States. NBRC investments and policies are approved by the vote of the Federal Co-Chair and the collective vote of the majority of State Governors.

As a Federal-State partnership, the NBRC enjoys a strong network of State economic development leaders who provide guidance and support for NBRC programs. Such support also helps NBRC staff maintain knowledge of local conditions throughout its extensive service area.

The NBRC partnership is also aided by Local Development Districts, which serve multiple functions: Technical assistance to grantees; assistance with identifying sources of complementary funds; and administration of NBRC grant funds.

The staff of the NBRC are a permanent, non-partisan administrative structure, charged with implementation of the strategic vision of the Members, including NBRC's grant programs.

Overview

By statute, the NBRC is required to annually assess the level of economic and demographic distress within its region:

- To have reliable and timely data that can inform NBRC leadership as they create and improve economic and infrastructure funding programs,
- To create a benchmark in which annual compilations of economic and demographic data can be compared to the NBRC's strategic goals,
- To identify whether the NBRC can provide grants to projects within a county,
- · Level of match required by grant applicants for projects,
- To assist States as they develop their own economic and community development programs, and
- To provide publicly available information so local decision makers can prioritize their economic and community development strategies.

Federal law (**40 U.S.C.**, **Subtitle V**, **§15702**) states that, '**distressed**' counties are those that, "have high rates of poverty, unemployment, or outmigration" and "are the most severely and persistently economically distressed and underdeveloped." The NBRC is required to allocate 50% of its total appropriations to projects in counties falling within this designation. The maximum percent of a "distressed" project that can be funded by the NBRC is **80**%.

'Transitional' counties "have recently suffered high rates of poverty, unemployment, or outmigration" or "are economically distressed and underdeveloped." The maximum percent of a "transitional" project that can be funded by the NBRC is 50%.

'Attainment' counties are those that are neither 'distressed' nor 'transitional.' The NBRC does not fund projects within an attainment county unless the project is in an **isolated area of distress** or has been granted a significant benefit waiver. Isolated areas of distress are "areas [municipalities] that have high rates of poverty, unemployment, or outmigration. A **significant benefit waiver** is an exemption that exists when an applicant is not otherwise eligible by geography but can prove significant economic benefits to NBRC Distressed or Transitional areas.

Because poverty, unemployment, and outmigration are only parts of an economic situation, the NBRC has adopted categories above and beyond those directed by statute. These "Secondary Distress Categories" provide a more in-depth survey of the NBRC's service area as well as greater opportunities to gauge the success of the NBRC's programs over time. These include: Educational Attainment (bachelor's degree or higher), Household Income, and Seasonal Home Ownership.

Geographies

The NBRC region includes the following counties:

- Maine: The counties of Androscoggin, Aroostook, Franklin, Hancock, Kennebec, Knox, Lincoln, Oxford, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Somerset, Waldo, and Washington
- New Hampshire: The counties of Belknap, Carroll, Cheshire, Coös, Grafton, Merrimack, and Sullivan
- New York: The counties of Cayuga, Clinton, Essex, Franklin, Fulton, Genesee, Greene, Hamilton, Herkimer, Jefferson, Lewis, Livingston, Madison, Montgomery, Niagara, Oneida, Orleans, Oswego, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Schoharie*, Seneca, St. Lawrence, Sullivan, Warren, Washington, Wayne, Wyoming, and Yates




